

On 19th September 2025, the students of Classes IX and X attended a special day-long training session conducted by Father Toby and his team from Atmamitra. Though the class spanned the entire day, it felt far too short because of its depth and impact.

The session began with a unique exercise where Father Toby called upon a girl who did not have an elder brother. Through a blind experience, she was guided to "meet" her brother using physical and mental stimulatory cues. The purpose was to show how easily desire can be misused if not understood correctly. Watching this unfold was profoundly moving; I found myself shedding a tear as I imagined being in her place.

This was followed by a thought-provoking game in which we had to write as many zeroes as possible in our notebooks, starting with a set goal. Across three rounds, I surpassed my expectations—beginning with 41 and reaching 79 by the end. The activity revealed that our only real limitations are those we impose on ourselves, and that with determination and encouragement, anything is possible.

Later, we were asked to close our eyes, recall our worst memory, and mentally cover it with strokes of black paint on an imaginary canvas. This exercise, aimed at letting go of past trauma and embracing a renewed self, was my favourite part. It was sentimental, liberating, and unforgettable.

The final segment of the session was the most emotional. As soft music played, we were led to reflect on our parents. Within moments, many of us broke down. Holding hands, resting our heads on each other, and keeping our eyes closed, we experienced a powerful release of emotion. I, too, wept. When we finally opened our eyes, we hugged one another and received blessings from our teachers—our hearts still overflowing with emotion.

By the end of the day, I felt transformed. My worldview had shifted, and my bond with myself and others grew deeper. I am truly grateful to Father Toby and his team from Atmamitra for gifting us such a once-in-a-lifetime experience—one that will forever remain etched in my heart.
